"Jim Buchanan was my first mentor in my effort to make a career in academia. In 1958, Jim received a draft copy of my first book The Politics of Bureaucracy. He contacted me and helped me get a post-doctoral fellowship at his university, i.e., the University of Virginia. I had some ideas for another book. Jim had related ideas, and we collaborated on the book which became The Calculus of Consent. This book was to underlie the formation of "public choice" some years later.

Jim and I were to work together at VPI [Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University] and George Mason University, promoting the concepts of public choice as well as our separate interests in other areas. This collegial and personal friendship continued throughout our careers.

I consider Jim an intellectual giant in our mutual areas of economic and governmental studies.
